Texas public schools should be held to appropriate standards of academic performance by an accountability system that accurately reflects the continuous improvement of students.





The Challenge

School rankings in Texas are based heavily on one test, and are the only factor used in 3rd through 8th grade

Where We Stand

Real-time assessments that inform instruction and measure individual student progress should be one of several measures used by an accountability system that reflects the entire educational experience.








Texans' Confidence in STAAR Drops








Skepticism in STAAR Increases Over Time








Texans Trust Teachers More than STAAR

Only 1% of Texas Teachers Report They are Very Confident in STAAR



Teacher quality

Access to fine arts. foreign language instruction, and other enrichment programs
